## Called by Christ to Give Thanks



"See that none of you repays evil for evil, but always seek to do good to one another and to all. Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. Do not quench the Spirit. Do not despise prophecies, but test everything; hold fast to what is good; abstain from every form of evil." – 1 Thessalonians 5:15-22

Thank you. Those two words are often overlooked, underestimated, ignored, and yet they carry a tremendous amount of power. Thanking someone is a way to recognize they have done something for you. They have made the burdens of life easier; they have served you in some way, they have noticed you, they have cared for you. All of that and more is rolled into two simple words "Thank you." Yet even so how often do we in society take time to thank everyone for doing something? Do we thank the person who bags our groceries, so we don't have to? Do we thank the person who takes time to wait and hold a door for us because they want to show us love, respect, and courtesy? Do we thank the person who takes our garbage, delivers our mail, etc. or do we just take these services for granted?

In his first letter to the church in Thessaloniki, the oldest New Testament work, St. Paul tells them to rejoice always and give thanks no matter what they are going through / experiencing. St. Paul is writing this to Christians who are experiencing real persecution. They are routinely being excluded from jobs because of their faith, they are being mocked, stereotyped, physically assaulted, and in some cases murdered for their faith in Christ. What is St. Paul's advice for them? Don't get mad, get even? An eye for an eye? No. St. Paul tells them that under no circumstances should they meet evil or sinful actions with the same. If someone does evil to them, they are to respond with goodness. Even harder St. Paul tells them to give thanks (to God) in all things. So, whether things are going well in their lives or poorly, they are to give thanks and praise to God.

November is a month where we are called to reflect on what it means to give thanks as a Christian. On Thanksgiving many in our society, religious or not, will take time to reflect on what they are thankful for in their lives. As Christians we are called in our baptisms to do this every day. The truth is this is a spiritual discipline and can only be done with the grace of God. It's easy to give thanks when you come into unexpected money, pay off a debt, are healthy, etc. It's hard to give thanks and praise to God when you are struggling with debt, when you get a diagnosis you didn't expect, when a loved one dies, etc.

Yet we are called in our baptisms to give thanks and praise to God for his goodness no matter what we are going through. Why? Because giving thanks in all things reminds us and others of our inherent dignity as human beings who bear the image of God, strengthens our faith in the promises of God, reminds us of God's deep and abiding love for us and all creation, shows the love of Christ to others, and can inspire others around us.

Thank you. When is the last time you said this? Who might you have overlooked in saying these powerful words to? As we are preparing to celebrate the Thanksgiving holiday, I hope that you and your loved ones have a wonderful and safe Thanksgiving. I hope that you take some time to pray

together and reflect on what you are thankful for in your life, what blessings God has given you, and what your hopes are for the coming year. I hope that you will find comfort that in Word and Sacrament the Triune God freely offers you endless grace that by the Holy Spirit you can be freed to give thanks in all things. I hope above all you know how deeply thankful I am to have each of you as part of my life and that of my family.

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#### **Election Anxiety**

I write this as we prepare for Election Day and the aftermath of a presidential election. I expect the election is all we will be talking about for the next few weeks. I find wisdom in contributing to the conversation prior to knowing the outcome of the election.

In my fairytale imagination, the anxiety many of us felt over politics disappeared with the relentless run of political ads. The outcome of the election was undeniable and resulted in a quick concession speech. As a result, in the week after the election, our nation united behind our next president, whomever it is. As I said, my fairytale imagination.

In my honest imagination, I wonder how long we will wait after Election Day to learn the results and how rigorously those results will be challenged and discredited. I worry about how long we will live under the threat of political violence and how we will respond if and when political violence occurs. On this side of Election Day, I pray for the safety of poll workers and those who certify elections. I pray that the vote will not in any way be suppressed. I pray for a peaceful transition of power. Mostly I look to God for help because I am afraid of what this election will reveal about us as a nation.

I find hope in an image that Pastor Zachariah Shipman of University Lutheran Church in East Lansing offered his congregation. Picture a blue donkey on the left and a red elephant on the right. Above them reigns a white lamb. The message is clear. On the day after the election, as on the day before, God is still God. Jesus loves and reigns in the world. The Holy Spirit is at work among us and in our country.

In the weeks after the election, perhaps more than anything else, we need Jesus to save us from division. We are divided in our politics. We are divided over what constitutes the truth. Common ground appears impossible to find; compromise is regarded as anathema. Polarization and tribalism are the norm. We have lost our ability and our appetite to overcome our division.

Jesus gives us a new identity we can embrace, a future we can live into, and power to do both. Jesus unites us as God's children: "There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28). Christ empowers us to strive to overcome rather than contribute to division by claiming this identity for ourselves and regarding others, first and foremost, as also one with us in Christ. We regard no one from a human point of view. For "if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us" (2 Corinthians 5:16–19).

This is not a fairytale. This is the gospel, the good news our nation needs the church to bring today. As children of God and disciples of the Lord Jesus who are empowered by the Holy Spirit, our vocation is to hang onto this hope and to share this hope with others. By virtue of our baptism into Christ's death and resurrection, we are to be both a "prophetic presence" and a "reconciling and healing presence" in the world, both denouncing sin and mediating conflicts to serve the common good (*Church in Society*, pp. 3-4). We are to take up and participate in the essential work of repairing a divided nation, work that is just beginning. We are to remain steadfast in pursuing God's call to care for others and be united in Christ.

Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid" (John 14:27). I am deeply moved by the many ways you all have recognized and given thanks for my 44 years of ministry and for my work on the Synod Staff. I give thanks for the gifts, cards, support, and for those who were able to be present at the celebration event on November 2, 2024.

It was a wonderful experience to have family, friends, representatives of the synod, especially Bishop Satterlee, and former parishioners gather at Christ the King in Gladwin, where I served as pastor from 1996 to 2014.

As I move into retirement, I continue to look back over those years and give thanks to God for the ways individuals, families, and congregations have invited me into their lives and ministry. The greatest gift has been to share the Gospel story of Jesus and to bring a word of grace to those who need to hear it.

I came away from the retreat feeling intellectually and spiritually full and, while I can't speak for everyone, I think the feeling was mutual for many of us. It's always great to spend time learning, worshipping, and conversing with colleagues and friends.

### Living Lutheran Returns

Last year, it was announced that *Living Lutheran*, the ELCA's magazine, would end its print run. Since then, the ELCA has been working to create a new experience at LivingLutheran.org, which it hopes to unveil in 2025.

During this process, the ELCA reached out to former magazine readers and current website users to better understand what people want to see and read. One thing that stood out was that they missed the stories in a print magazine and wanted to feel connected to the church through a regular publication that focused on stories about what it means to be a Lutheran in today's world.

Beginning in 2025, Living Lutheran will again appear as a print magazine, published quarterly. This frequency will allow people to reconnect in a way that makes them feel part of the ELCA while keeping costs efficient and effective to produce the magazine.

### 2023 Mission Support Thank You

ELCA's members, congregations, synods and churchwide organization are called to be church together. Every year around \$1.6 billion is shared as regular offerings to ELCA congregations and worshiping communities. Over 5% of that generosity is shared with the ELCA's 65 synods, a portion of which is then shared with the churchwide organization. This is called Mission Support.

In FY2023, the North/West Lower Michigan Synod shared \$609,345 directly in Mission Support for ELCA churchwide ministries. Whether utilized locally, regionally, nationally or internationally, Mission Support enables us to have a greater impact in communities — working together to share God's abundant grace with others.

### Making Advent and Christmas Evangelistic

During the Advent and Christmas seasons, many churches offer a variety of activities including community meals for folks that have nowhere to go. As we invite folks to church for meals and other activities, what if we ask them about their lives, listen to their stories about their faith, joys, and sorrows, and also tell them who we are and why we serve? What if we tell them about Jesus?

- · Where have you seen Jesus at work in the community?
- · What has Jesus been poking you to do?
- How has Jesus given you hope?
- · Invite them to worship in a community of Jesus

Luke 2:20 says, "The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they has seen and heard." We imagine them telling everyone they met the amazing story of the birth of Jesus. How will we share the story in this season?

#### ELCA Evangelism Network shares a list of ideas:

- Take worship, or a carol sing to places in your community a nursing home, park, with first responders, the hospital, a mall, a pub, or other community gatherings. Invite others to join in and sing.
- Go to places to listen to people's joys and sorrows, laments, and struggles and tell of Jesus welcome and comfort. Use the example of Jake Jacobson's Christmas Front Porchin'. Take time in a public place with a sign and a small table and chairs: "Tell Me A Christmas Story."
- Stage a Live Nativity or a Christmas Walk telling the story of the Word Become Flesh.
- Host a walk like the Stations of the Cross, but stations in the Christmas story. It can be signs and Bible
  verses at each stop, or a narrator or actor at each stop. Culminate with a campfire and hot chocolate with
  a Christmas Carol Sing.
- Bless people find ways to pronounce a blessing upon the people being served at a community dinner or food distribution and pray for/with them.
- · Invite friends or other family members to serve with you in holiday community service.
- Post invitations on social media or send or hand out invitations. Check out the free <u>Christmas</u> Communications resources from the ELCA.
- · Invite all the people you encountered to come to worship on Christmas Eve/Christmas Day.
- · Ask people to tell you their faith journey story find ways to invite them into further conversations.
- Recruit a listening team to accompany volunteer workers so some are working/serving and others are listening to those being served.
- Ask those being served what they think are things the church should be doing to help the community or what are important community needs.
- · Adopt families through local charities that the church can sponsor.
- Plan worship services that include familiar music and that use a variety of ways/media of telling the Christmas story.
- Above all else tell the story make Jesus the reason for the season.
- · Host a community Blue Christmas Service.
- Advertise activities on social media and local newspapers.
- · Plan Christmas dramas for kids or adults.
- · Light the church driveway with luminaries.
- · Have parking lot greeters or carolers for Christmas Eve worship.
- Pay attention to the Sunday after Christmas and invite new folks to come back for more Christmas next week.
- · If a congregation has a family service, focus on kids with stories, activities, and action.
- · Work with the neighborhood association to partner on holiday events.
- Consider having a family service earlier on December 24 or even December 23 so that it does not
  conflict with family events on Christmas Eve.

#### Living Water Ministries Executive Director

The Living Water Ministries Board of Directors is proud to announce that Nicole McCarthy has been selected as our new Executive Director. Earlier this year, former executive director C.J. Clark accepted a leadership role with the Southeast Michigan Synod, prompting the Board to initiate an extensive nationwide search for a successor. In partnership with various synods, the American Camping Association, and the Lutheran Outdoor Ministry Network, the Board received applications from across the country and the wider church community.

After carefully reviewing resumes and references, the search committee conducted interviews with the top candidates, ultimately recommending Nicole for her strong background and expertise in outdoor ministry. ## Changes to Humana Medicare Advantage and MyMichigan Medical

The Synod Office has been advised that, for those who subscribe to Humana Medicare Advantage, all services at MyMichigan Health facilities will become "out-of-network" as of:

- January 23, 2025: MyMichigan Medical Centers in Alpena, Saginaw, Sault Ste. Marie, Standish, Tawas, and West Branch
- July 1, 2025: MyMichigan Medical Centers in Alma, Clare, Gladwin, Mt. Pleasant and MyMichigan Medical Group

This change means MyMichigan will bill Humana as an "out-of network" provider and that those who participate in Humana Medicare Advantage may be billed for the remainder of the costs that insurance does not cover. This means that the Humana Medicare Advantage offered through Portico of the ELCA may cost more than other Medicare Advantage Programs that MyMichigan Health treats as "in-network."

The North/West Lower Michigan Synod announces the next session of our Adult Theological Education program: Jesus ar the Little Children. Join the Rev. Dr. Amy Lindeman Allen, Associate Professor of New Testament at Christian Theologic Seminary, for a six-week study starting January 14, 2025!

Based on Dr. Allen's book, The Gifts They Bring: How Children in the Gospels Can Shape Inclusive Ministry (WJK, 2023), sessions will include presentations on the following topics:

- 2. The Gift of Proclamation: The Bethlehem Shepherds
- 3. The Gift of Advocacy: James and John, Fisherfolk
- 4. The Gift of Listening: Mary at the Feet of Jesus
- 5. The Gift of Sharing: The Child with the Fish and Loave
- 6. The Gift of Partnership: A Son and His Mother at Nain

The Rev. Dr. Amy Lindeman Allen is Indiana Christian Church Associate Professor of New Testament at Christian Theological Seminary (Disciples of Christ) in Indianapolis, Indiana. She is an ordained minister in the ELCA and has served three ELCA and one Episcopal congregation. She and her husband J. Erik Allen, also an ELCA pastor, were married in the Northwest Lower Michigan Synod at Trinity Lutheran Church in Kalamazoo, MI. They now reside in Brownsburg, IN with their three children and two dogs. Dr. Allen's research interests center around the Synoptic Gospels, especially the Gospel of Luke, and its intersections with people on the margins. She is especial interested in the presence of children in the gospels and how reading with attention to children both in the biblica times and today can inspire more inclusive ministry. To this end, she also serves as the director for a new Lily funded grant entitled *Growing in God's Word*, a part of the *Nurturing Children through Worship and Prayer Initiative* intended to implement child-centered storytelling in parishes.

The class will meet on six consecutive Tuesday evenings: January 14, 21, 28; February 4, 11, 18, 2025 from 7:00 – 8:15pm ET via Zoom. This course is open to all adults, both laypeople and rostered ministers, and is free of charge Registration is required and will close on January 6, 2025. 


